


# WOOD PROJECT DESIGNS

It's a bit brittle and can be a cause of a few splinters, but it has spectacular variegated figure when finished with oil!

### **AUGUST MEETING HIGHLIGHTS- SHARPENING YOUR TOOLS**


The August meeting was all about sharpening. After Rollie Johnson gave us an overview of what sharp is for woodworking tools, he covered using sandpaper to sharpen. Mark Voigt demonstrated the Work Sharp, Don Peterson demonstrated water stone and the Tormek wet grinding system, and Kurt Zniewski demonstrated diamond stones and using a strop to sharpen tools. There were jigs displayed for holding tools including those from Lee Valley, Lie Nielsen, and the Eclipse style.

The club has a set of King water stones, granite with sandpaper, and the Tormek grinder with some accessories.














# DESIGN AND DESIGN CRITIQUE

# THE GUEST SPEAKERS FOR THIS MEETING ARE BOTH ART PROFESSORS FROM ST. CLOUD STATE UNIVERSITY.

<u>Bill Gorcica</u> is an interdisciplinary multimedia artist particularly interested in interactive art. With a background in both art and science, he produces work that combines traditional and new media, oftentimes addressing issues related how we as humans relate to nature.

Currently, Mr. Gorcica has been collaborating with Japanese and American scientists in the creation of an educational computer game about water quality by exploring different river ecosystems.

He has received a number of grants and fellowships for his creative work including a bush foundation Artist Fellowship in 3D Visual Arts, a Jerome Travel and Study Grant in New Media, a MN State Arts Board Artists Initiative Grant, and a Public Arts Research Grant from Forecast Public Art.

Bill has also been a Fulbright Scholar, spending nearly a year abroad, making graphic prints in Krakow, Poland.

Bill's presentation will focus on general design concepts—and he's thinking of becoming a new CMWA member!

The Fiber artist, <u>Merle Sykora</u>, is coming back to CMWA by popular demand. Professor of Art at SCSU from 1965-1996, Merle first worked with us a few years ago and provided invaluable advice on individual members' works. He will again offer his advice and expertise at this meeting.

Merle Sykora is a fiber artist who taught art for 36 years, 32 at St. Cloud State. He is a board certified interior designer and ASID professional (American Society of Interior Designers). Merle has been associated for 48 years with Tom Olson, an apprentice with Frank Lloyd Wright, who was involved with building, furniture, and lighting design. You can view his 44' wall hanging at the St. Cloud Public library.

If you would like to see some of Merle's work, head over the the library at St. Cloud State. His work, "Sunshine Rain" was originally created in 1976 for the Biennial International Textile Exhibition, in which one artist from each of the 50 states was invited to participate. Prof. Sykora generously donated the sculpture to SCSU in 2011 and then installed it in the second floor reading court of Miller Center in honor of John Berling, dean of Learning Resource Services from 1977 to 1997.

### Build a Miter Fold & Veneered Box with Bob Van Dyke- 3 days

October 24, 25, & 26, 2022 Instructor—Bob VanDyke Fee: \$450 + materials

If you have ever done any re-sawing then you know how cool a book matched panel can be. When you incorporate veneers into your work the possibilities for creating spectacular patterns are almost endless! Book matching is the simple one- but what about radial matching or "book & butt"? In this hands-on class students will each make a small "Miter Fold" box out of walnut and while doing that we will explore the endless possibilities of working with veneer create a striking top for the box.

### Making Tablesaw Jigs & Fixtures with Bob Van Dyke-3 days

October 27, 28, & 29, 2022 Instructor—Bob VanDyke Fee: \$450 + materials

The idea of making jigs and fixtures for the tablesaw is always one that creates a lot of debate. Some people insist that they are not worth it and "just do it by hand" while other people love coming up with intricate fixtures that do a specific job really well. Bob's approach is somewhere in the middle- will the jig be useful enough to be used over & over again and is it better than one that can be easily purchased? This class is Not a beginning tablesaw class. Participants must have some working experience with tablesaws & routers. Note: because of the design of the jigs for the table saw you must have a table saw with a Biessemeyer type fence (i.e., Sawstop, Jet, Powermatic). Bench top or "Job site" saws will not work with these jigs. Specify type of saw you own when registering.
