- What tools do I need if I am a power tool woodworker?











# **MARCH MEETING HIGHLIGHTS**

The March 15th meeting topic was about boxes with a focus on mitered boxes using the recent box class project as an example. Don Peterson was the presenter. The mitered box class was taught by Don Peterson and Tim DuBois.

Boxes are a great foundation project for all our woodworking. They allow great skill building opportunities as well as the ability to experiment with design and joinery on a small scale. The class project presented tips on pre-cutting the box sides to allow cutting a lift off lid after the box was assembled. The mitered box also allows precutting rabbets and dadoes through the box sides without out worrying about stopped dadoes.

We briefly touched on other box types including dovetailed, box joint, and lock rabbet joints. These could be topics for future CMWA classes.

## SLIDES FROM "MAKING A MITER-FOLD BOX" CLASS



A common element of the last four classes we have held has been the miter joint

# MORE SLIDES FROM"MAKING A MITER-FOLD BOX".

- Cut grooves and rabbets first
  - The mitered box offers the advantage of cutting grooves and rabbets in the board before cutting the miters for the sides. Helps insure perfect line up of the grooves.
  - Cut the 14" grooves that will create a lip for the top when the box is cut apart
  - . Cut a groove for the box bottom
  - Cut a rabbet for the Kumiko panel in the lid or cut a groove to hold a solid panel
- Sand and finish inside of the box being careful not to finish any areas that will be glued
  - Shellac is a good choice of finish for the inside of the box. Oils or varnishes will smell for a long time. We used Zinsser Seal Coat cut 50%.

## Prep box for glue up

- o Cut box bottom to size
- a Rabbet to fit groove in box side
- o Line up box sides in order against a straight edge and tape them together
- o Check miters are square to the straight edge
- · Fold box together with bottom inserted and check miter fit
  - o If the top is captured in a groove insert it at this step also
- · Prep clamps and glue up box
  - Don't overapply glue resulting in squeeze out. Especially inside the box.
  - Using hide glue for the bottom allows extra time to position the bottom





#### Cut the side miters on a table saw sled

- Mark the sides to keep track of the outside of the board and the correct order to maintain grain match around the corners
- What is important in cutting the box side miters
  - . Start with four square material, all the same thickness
  - 45 degree angle accuracy
  - . 90 degree angle to the bottom and top
  - . Length of opposing pieces is the same





## Cut the Box Apart

- . The box can be sanded before it is cut apart
- · Plan the cut so the top will completely overlap the lip on the bottom
- · Level the box bottom and top with a block plane or sandpaper
- . Fit the overlap of the box bottom and top using a shoulder plane or sand
- · Apply finish of choice





# **SHOW AND TELL - Making a Miter-Fold Box**



At the March meeting, Tim DuBois showed the walnut folded miter box he made at the Bob VanDyke class. The box had a quarter matched veneer top and was finished with several coats of shellac.





Don Peterson showed the "waterfall bench" he made at the seminar led by Grant Kaihoi in February. He also brought along the mitered box with a Kumiko panel that was the project in


# **KUMIKO WORKSHOP - April 11, 2023**


Six members attended the Kumiko workshop. Working from 5 to 9pm, most everybody finished their panel. We mostly worked with the Asanoha pattern using basswood pieces. The grid work was all pre-cut and ready to glue up. The CMWA has 8 sets of the jigs used for trimming the angled pieces on this pattern. The most popular Japanese style saw for cutting the pieces was a Suizan 6 inch pull saw.






