## 2019 Retrospective

It's interesting to do a retrospective on 2019 for the CMWA. If you'd haul out all your newsletters from last year, you, too, could see how much we have accomplished as a club and what kinds of things we hope might be ahead in 2020. The Board and the club members are always open to ideas and suggestions on where you would like to see us continue to grow and expand our programming, so please feel free as a member to offer your advice.

We started out with an ambitious plan to link all the meetings by a common theme, *the humble box*, and had hoped to take the first "box" through to a finished project (maybe a piece of furniture) by the end of the year. Our thought was that individual members would bring their projects every month as they evolved and progressed, based on the cycle of the meetings. I think this year the Board learned something: it is very difficult to stick with a themed approach because there just too many variables, like the weather (February's meeting was rescheduled due to a snowstorm), technological impediments (iPads and the club projector refused to wed for Rollie's presentation) and the fact that the plan to see evolving projects from meeting to meeting did not materialize.

We have relied on the expertise/knowledge/sense of responsibility of the Board members to present over half the programming. January: Shawn and Kurt (the humble box); February: Mark Voigt and Devin (creating plans); March, Rollie Johnson (creating a cut list); May: Charlie Gunderson (four-square lumber); June: Don Peterson (making a drawer with dovetails); September: Mike Ross (prepping for finish) and Rollie Johnson (sharpening card scrapers); November: repeat offender Don Peterson (the annual safety presentation). Another three meetings brought in other presenters (April with member Tim Ziegler on buying lumber, a guest presenter in October on German Osmo finishing products and the August "outing" to the Barrel Factory in Avon). July and December are always reserved for the club party time, picnicking and celebrating the holidays, and they were well attended. Going into 2020, we hope more members will share their expertise and knowledge for the meetings; we know there is lots of untapped expertise in the club. That's why we're starting out 2020 with a visit to a new member's shop to see how Grant Haikoi works with live edge materials and hope that other members will step forward to make 2020 a truly member-driven year.

A new initiative in 2019 was the monthly "open shop night" the first Thursday of every month. The club's ability to open the shop for general club use is thanks to the commitment of Board members to supervise them and assist members with their projects. We were also helped greatly by the purchase of shop equipment from Spring Lake HS and a shaper and dust collection equipment, so that, as Devin said in one of his letters, it "makes it easy to walk in and get right to work". After a slow start (and a misstep commandeering the time to finish up a project for the August Art Crawl), by November, open shop activities included using the planer on some wide maple boards, building a table saw sled, and dowel making; in December people squared up large oak planks for a table top, planed and sanded cutting boards for holiday gifts, glued up stock for bedposts and prepared materials the upcoming Joe Morgan veneer class. We hope to see more members taking advantage of the open shop nights: at the first meeting this year, we will be handing out liability waivers for using the shop and hope in the near future to be certifying members to use all the power equipment in the shop.

In the "show and tell" parts of the meetings, we got to see the evergreen appeal of a cribbage board (Marlin Eich and Mike Ross brought theirs in); a chest of drawers with drawer faces make out of single board across the front Charlie Gunderson made; Lenny Merdan showed off his very cool fruit bowl; Eddy Och showed us a turned candle holder and Faust Gertz shared a washer toss game. Tim Dubois explained his small tabletop bench for handwork and Jerome Swensen brought in a walnut cane with the Air Force Emblem inlaid he made for his father-in-law. Devin Middendorf got us all ready for his upcoming nuptials with a lantern and a wedding card box. We also go to see the products of some of the workshops and classes we've been offering: Don Peterson showed the wall cabinet he made at the Mike Pekovich class.

This year CMWA brought in regionally and nationally known woodworkers to share their expertise: Kevin Southwick came for a one-day class on the Fundamentals of Finishing; Joe Morgan spent two days here teaching about decorative veneering and Mike Pekovich spent five days taking participants through the construction of a Kumiko wall cabinet. Mike Siemsen led us through a weekend making a Moxon-type vise, a mallet, marking gauge and marking knife. And our own Mark Voigt once again taught an intermediate basic woodworking class. We are well on our way to becoming a place people come to expand their woodworking horizons. And don't forget that we hosted the Lie Nielsen tool event! They were so pleased with the attendance that they have agreed to return this year.

The CMWA is more than the sum of its parts: monthly meetings, open shop nights, classes, art crawl appearances and networking; it's a place where woodworkers join to celebrate their common passion for the art and joy of woodworking. Thank you for adding your voice and talents to our shared endeavor and we look forward to seeing you at the meetings in 2020!
