“Tour of Ferche Millworks”

Charlie Meyer of Ferche Millwork offered our club a tour of their millwork plant complete with a video presentation to start it off.

Ferche Millwork is celebrating its 50th year in business this year. They are now the largest hardwood millwork manufacturer in the United States, being one of the premier producers of finished hardwood millwork for the construction trade.

Bob Ferche, and his brother Frank started Ferche Millwork, way back in 1958, at the same location where it stands today, right there on the North end of Rice Minnesota. They vastly expanded the plant in 1982, and by 1985 employed sixty people, and boasted over \$40 million dollars in sales annually, upgrading to a nearly fully automated manufacturing process, which now produces over 200 ft of finished millwork per minute. The business was eventually sold to Bob Fox owner of RAF Industries. Ferche Millwork sells primarily to the northern half of the U.S. as well as a good portion of Canada. Last year they manufactured over 7,000 different types of mouldings, of which over 50% were custom made for varying customers. Some 70% of their mouldings are made of Red Oak. Today they manufacture 18 million board feet of millwork annually. They have as many as 190 employees when times are good. Ferche also owns a hardwood lumber mill in Mount Pleasant, Tennessee, an advantage because it brings the mill much closer to the forests of Kentucky, Indiana, and Tennessee, where the majority of the hardwood is grown. Their Tennessee plant not only saws lumber, but it's kiln's have a capacity of 400 thousand board feet per loading, while their Rice plant boast a kiln capacity in excess of 650 thousand board feet.

They use nearly every scrap of the lumber in their manufacturing process, even finger jointing the shorter pieces for veneering components. They use 20% of the sawdust produced for heating their plants, and sell the remaining 80% to the farming community for animal bedding.

On Wednesday September 3rd six members of the CMWA attended an interactive presentation and book signing at "Bookin' It" bookstore in Little Falls. Spike Carlsen who wrote "A Splintered History of Wood" entertained us with some show-and-tell from his travels in the world of wood. Carlsen is the former Executive Editor of The Family Handyman magazine and currently writes "Ask Spike" for Backyard Living magazine. He and his family live in Stillwater, MN.

Spike's collection (which we were encouraged to hold) includes a wood pulley from the 1700's, and a \$1,600 wood cowboy hat turned from a 30 lb. hunk of maple by Johannes Michelsen. He also had a small walnut box with perfectly cut dovetails that was built by a gentleman who was blind (Spike explained how there is a movement to help the disabled work with wood). There was a pencil that had the complete alphabet carved into it ...with a chain saw! Most impressive was a slab of kauri wood that was pulled from a bog in New Zealand that was carbon dated to be 50,000 years old.

Spike is a self diagnosed introvert and barely a novice woodworker, but his passion for wood is evident in his writing. Pick up a copy at your favorite bookstore. For every book that's sold, one tree will be planted at a mission school in Tanzania that will be harvested in about 10 years to provide an income for the school.
